The analysis emphasizes that fostering gender culture in education is essential for building a just, respectful, and progressive society.

Introduction

In his work *The Strategy of New Uzbekistan*, the President of the Republic of Uzbekistan, Shavkat Mirziyoyev, emphasizes that one of the primary goals of the country's current state policy is to elevate attention and practical care toward women to a fundamentally new and advanced level. He underlines the importance of strengthening the social role and status of women, as well as ensuring their rights and interests. The president especially highlights the idea that "educating women



means educating a knowledgeable, enlightened, and capable society,” stressing the need for consistent implementation of this principle in all spheres of life.

The analysis of the development of gender culture in education reveals the main directions of ongoing social transformation. Gender equality plays a pivotal role in the educational process, as it expands opportunities for all students and supports their comprehensive development. This development-oriented analysis examines the impact of gender stereotypes, disparities in access to education, and inconsistencies in teaching methods. Education, as one of the key institutions of socialization, serves as a vital sphere of public life where societal values and attitudes are shaped.

In Uzbekistan, the advancement of the education system is recognized as a leading direction of the state's social policy. According to the Constitution of the Republic of Uzbekistan, every citizen has the right to education, and the state guarantees free general education (Article 50 of the Constitution).

The country's education policy truly ensures the de facto equality of all citizens regardless of gender, and acknowledges the interests of men and women as distinct social groups within its broader framework. In this context, the adoption and implementation of a gender strategy is of great significance. The core objective of this strategy is to guarantee equal rights and opportunities for women and men, regardless of race, nationality, language, religion, social origin, belief, or personal and social status. This policy forms an essential component of national development efforts, and numerous measures are being taken to promote gender equality across all spheres of society.

The declaration of the principle of equal educational opportunities for all citizens places a clear responsibility on the education system to promote equity, including gender parity. Gender equality in education extends beyond merely providing equal access for men and women; it also encompasses achieving comparable educational outcomes across genders. This, in turn, reflects the extent to which gender equity principles are respected in the broader allocation of societal resources and the success of initiatives aimed at balancing opportunities between sexes. Developing gender-inclusive educational policies must begin with a critical awareness of existing disparities, a thorough assessment of their magnitude, a careful examination of underlying causes, and a strategic approach to mitigating them.



Central to this effort is a focused evaluation of gender segregation as a persistent and influential dynamic within the educational sphere.

In analyzing gender equality in education, several distinct dimensions can be identified. UNESCO recommends the application of its Gender Equality Framework to promote gender equity in education. This framework includes:

Equality of access: This refers to creating equal opportunities for both boys and girls to access formal and informal education without discrimination.

Equality in the learning process: This involves ensuring that boys and girls receive fair treatment, attention, and assessment throughout the learning process. It also implies designing inclusive curricula that consider and accommodate different learning needs without bias toward gender.

Equality of educational outcomes: This emphasizes that academic achievements and evaluations should be based on individual talent and effort, not gender. Educational duration, qualifications, and diplomas must not differ based on one's sex, ensuring equal opportunities for success.

Equality of external results: This reflects equal status and opportunities for men and women in accessing resources, participating in economic, social, cultural, and political life, and contributing equally to development.

Furthermore, promoting a culture of gender equality in students' minds depends on three key factors:

Teachers and mentors – their attitudes and guidance are pivotal in shaping students' views on equality.

Family members – including grandparents and parents, play a foundational role in socializing children with equitable values.

Peer groups – such as friends, classmates, and social circles, significantly influence the reinforcement or rejection of gender norms.

Combating Gender Stereotypes and Discrimination in Education:

Ensuring gender equality within the educational process requires active efforts to eliminate stereotypes and challenge discriminatory practices. Creating an inclusive, respectful environment is crucial for fostering genuine equality and empowering all learners, regardless of gender.

To effectively promote gender equality in education, work must be done in the following key areas:



Raising Awareness of Stereotypes: Students should be introduced to the concept of gender stereotypes and their impact on the educational process. Understanding how such biases shape attitudes and opportunities is essential for developing critical thinking and inclusivity.

Improving Educational Curricula: It is important to design and implement teaching materials that fully reflect the principles of gender equality. Educational content should challenge existing stereotypes and present diverse, inclusive perspectives.

Empowering Teachers: Teachers play a central role in combating gender inequality. They should receive targeted training to better understand gender-related issues and develop effective strategies to address them in the classroom.

Supporting Students: Promoting gender equality among students requires creating a safe space for dialogue. Actively listening to students' opinions and involving them in the discussion of challenges and solutions helps foster mutual respect and shared responsibility.

Transforming the Social Environment: Parents and the wider community must be engaged in raising awareness about gender equality. Joint efforts are needed to shift social attitudes and create a more supportive environment for all learners.

By pursuing these directions, the education system can ensure greater gender equity and actively counter discrimination. A gender-sensitive approach to education emphasizes the equal right of both sexes to participate in all aspects of public life, to express themselves, and to make autonomous life choices.

This does not imply that girls should be raised to emulate boys. Rather, it affirms the importance of encouraging both girls and boys to fully embrace their unique identities, realize their potential, meet their needs, pursue their ambitions, gain confidence, and live fulfilled, happy lives.

As E. N. Kamenskaya noted, “Modern priorities in raising boys and girls do not aim to merge the rigid norms of masculinity and femininity. Instead, they focus on developing the capacity for partnership, fostering humanistic values in both sexes, and nurturing the flexibility to adapt one's gender repertoire, along with sincerity, mutual understanding, and complementarity in relationships.

In this context, gender pedagogy has been emphasized as a key component within the broader framework of gender-sensitive approaches. It encompasses a set of strategies aimed at helping children feel comfortable and secure within the school



environment while supporting them in resolving challenges related to gender identity and self-identification.

The growing recognition of gender equality as a crucial factor in the development of social relations is becoming increasingly evident in today's society. Special attention is now being paid to enhancing the participation of women in social life, including within families and communities. As a result, significant reforms are being implemented both in societal attitudes and within the legal framework to ensure equitable opportunities.

Importantly, gender issues in culture should not be narrowly understood as limited to women's participation alone. A more comprehensive and effective perspective involves fostering mutual dialogue and creative collaboration between men and women. Recognizing the shared contributions of both genders in cultural and social processes ensures a more balanced and inclusive approach to development.

Collaborative creativity between genders may not always be harmonious; it can inherently involve elements of competition and conflict. Nonetheless, substantial research has been conducted on gender equality in education, highlighting the significance of identifying and addressing gender-related challenges within the educational system.

Strengthening gender equality in the educational process and ensuring equal access to learning opportunities for youth requires a comprehensive, research-based, and internationally informed approach. This involves several strategic directions:

Conducting Research: It is essential to expand scientific investigations into gender equality within the education system. These studies should explore the root causes of gender inequality and propose effective, evidence-based solutions.

Curriculum Improvement: Educational programs must be revised through a gender lens to ensure equal learning opportunities for all students. This includes eliminating discriminatory content and practices from the learning process.

Teacher Training: Educators should receive specialized training on gender equality. These programs should equip teachers to recognize and challenge stereotypes, and to create more inclusive learning environments.

Financial Support Mechanisms: To reduce economic barriers to education, especially for girls and boys from marginalized backgrounds, scholarships, grants, and other financial aid tools should be made available.



Raising Public Awareness: Public attention must be drawn to gender equality issues. Parents and communities need to be informed and engaged to foster widespread cultural support for gender parity in education.

Strengthening Partnerships: Collaboration with governmental and non-governmental organizations, including international partners, is key to advancing and institutionalizing gender equality policies in education.

Engaging Local Communities: Working with grassroots and community-based organizations helps expand educational access for both girls and boys and enhances their participation in public life.

Developing National Gender Equality Programs: It is necessary to design and implement state-level strategies and national action plans aimed at promoting gender equality. Active participation in the formulation and execution of these programs ensures sustainability and broad impact.

Conclusions

Achieving gender equality in education is a fundamental requirement for building an inclusive, fair, and progressive society. Despite significant advancements, persistent gender-based disparities continue to affect access to education, learning outcomes, and long-term opportunities for both girls and boys.
