He argues that comprehensible input should be slightly above the learner’s current proficiency level, known as the famous “i+1” formula. [6]

Meanwhile, L.S. Vygotsky’s **zone of proximal development** theory stresses the importance of creating a supportive environment (scaffolding) to maximize learners’ potential. Piaget’s cognitive development theory, on the other hand, highlights the interconnection between language acquisition and stages of intellectual growth, suggesting that instruction should consider learners’ existing knowledge structures.

Additionally, J. Cummins’ distinction between **Basic Interpersonal Communication Skills (BICS)** and **Cognitive Academic Language Proficiency (CALP)** provides an important theoretical basis. According to him, everyday



communicative skills differ from academic and professional language proficiency, and both need to be developed simultaneously. [1]

Local scholars have also contributed to this field. For instance, A. Karimov (2020) emphasized the effectiveness of communicative, integrative, and culture-based approaches in foreign language teaching. He noted that learners should develop not only linguistic competence but also intercultural communication skills. Similarly, N. Qosimova (2018) studied the role of modern ICT tools in language teaching and analyzed the impact of multimedia resources. [7]

Moreover, in international practice, particularly within the European Union, the **Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR)** has been developed to define language proficiency levels and establish assessment criteria. This model has also been introduced in Uzbekistan.
