



## **THE QUALITY AND EFFICIENCY OF PRIVATE AND PUBLIC HIGHER EDUCATION IN UZBEKISTAN**

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### **Abstract**

This article examines the comparative quality and efficiency of private and public higher education institutions in Uzbekistan. It explores the factors influencing student preferences, evaluates the strengths and weaknesses of both sectors, and highlights the challenges facing the education system. The study is based on primary data collected through surveys in Tashkent.

### **Introduction**

Education is necessary for the personality grooming of individual. There are different types of institutions available like private and public institutions, technical institutions, and madrasas (religious institutions). These institutes are having the triangle of three main pillars: consisted of teachers, students and curriculum. There are two main types of schools in Uzbekistan and all over the world. One is public, other is private school system, and university system as well. Nowadays, private schools are becoming more favourite and attractive for majority of the students due to their better education systems, test criteria and knowledge creation vis-a-vis public schools, which comparatively very cheap but inefficient are losing their attraction. Parents prefer to send their children in private schools and avoid public schools. The main objective of this study is to investigate why people prefer high



charging private schools over free public schools (that charge nothing)? We use primary data collected through constructed questionnaire and survey method was applied for collection of data from the target respondents of private and public schools located in Tashkent, Uzbekistan. The results show that five main factors emerge as important determinants of private school choice. These include the social economic status of the household, the degree of a school's accessibility, the cost of schooling parent's perceptions of school quality and their perceptions of the available employment opportunities in the region. Uzbekistan's higher education system has a deep history rooted in the Soviet era. During Soviet rule, higher education was highly centralized and standardized across the republics, including Uzbekistan. After gaining independence in 1991, Uzbekistan began transitioning towards a more modern and diversified higher education system. During this time, the state focused on expanding public institutions, while private universities gradually emerged in the 2000s to accommodate increasing demand for higher education.

Public higher education in Uzbekistan is primarily governed by the Ministry of Higher and Secondary Specialized Education. The country has a wide range of public universities that offer both undergraduate and graduate programs in various disciplines. Key features of the public higher education sector include:

Access to public universities is highly competitive, with entrance exams determining admission. The system is designed to identify the best and brightest students, but it has also been criticized for its reliance on rote memorization and a lack of innovation in testing methods. Additionally, there is a concern regarding regional disparities in access to quality public universities.

### **Quality of Teaching and Research**

While many public universities in Uzbekistan have experienced substantial improvements in teaching and research quality, there are still challenges related to outdated facilities, lack of resources, and underqualified faculty. However, the government has invested in the professional development of educators and the modernization of curricula in recent years.

### **Overview of Private Higher Education in Uzbekistan**

Private higher education institutions in Uzbekistan have been growing rapidly since the 2000s. These universities tend to be smaller than their public counterparts, with a focus on more niche areas of study.

#### **1. Flexibility and Specialization**

Private universities often offer programs that cater to contemporary fields like business, IT, tourism, and international relations. They provide more flexible study schedules, making them appealing to students who need to balance education with work or other responsibilities.

#### **2. Tuition Fees and Financing**

The major distinguishing factor between private and public universities is the cost. Private institutions tend to charge significantly higher tuition fees than public ones. This can limit access to higher education for students from lower socioeconomic backgrounds, although some private universities offer scholarships or financial aid programs to mitigate these challenges.



## **Quality of Education and Faculty**

The quality of education at private universities is often perceived to be higher due to smaller class sizes, more personalized attention, and updated curricula that are more aligned with international trends. However, some private institutions face challenges in attracting and retaining highly qualified faculty members due to their limited budgets.

## **4. Institutional Accreditation and Recognition**

In Uzbekistan, private universities are required to undergo accreditation processes to ensure that they meet certain academic standards. However, the accreditation and regulatory processes for private institutions are often criticized for being less transparent than those for public institutions, raising concerns about the validity and recognition of their degrees in the global academic community.

**Private Universities:** Private institutions rely on tuition fees, which can be expensive. However, they are generally more efficient in terms of financial management due to their need to remain competitive in a private market.

**Quality Assurance and Accreditation:** Both private and public universities are striving to improve quality assurance measures. The lack of a standardized national framework for accreditation has led to disparities in the recognition of degrees and qualifications.

**Outdated Infrastructure:** Many universities, especially public institutions, suffer from outdated infrastructure, limited technological resources, and insufficient access to modern educational tools.



**Faculty Development:** There is a need for continuous faculty development programs to ensure educators have the necessary skills and knowledge to deliver high-quality education.

**Access and Equity:** Access to higher education remains a challenge, particularly in rural areas, where students may not have the same opportunities to attend top universities.
